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JANUARY 7, 2005 DINNER IN <u>ATLANTA</u>

Your ACMS board has decided to try an experiment at the January meetings in Atlanta. In an attempt for ACMS to have a more visible role in the mathematical community, we have decided to make our annual dinner part of the official program and to hold it in a conference hotel. Our request to do this has been approved by the AMS/MAA planning committee. One factor which encouraged us in this direction is the fact that Tom Banchoff agreed to be our speaker, and that his name might encourage others to consider our organization. Another reason is the fact that some of the future joint meetings will include Sunday, when we can again propose to hold a worship service. The board will continue to discuss the idea of continuing this approach in future years – your input is welcomed.

This decision will of course lead to a meal that is more expensive than usual. We expect the cost to be about \$55, but because of contributions from ACMS and some of its members, we will be able to offer a significantly reduced price of \$40 (\$30 for ACMS members whose dues are current and \$20 for students). We will need to sell tickets in advance in order to guarantee an accurate count, so you will need to order your tickets before the meeting. You can do this by sending a check payable to ACMS for the appropriate amount. Use the enclosed form. We would be glad to accept payment above the minimum, but there is no obligation to do so.

Tom will speak on the topic Dali: The Christian Dimension. He will show 10 minutes of a documentary on Salvador Dali as part of his presentation. He met Dali on ten occasions over a period of ten years. Tom has been a featured speaker at two of the ACMS conferences and has been well received. He is a past president of the MAA, and recently received a prestigious award from the NSF for distinguished teaching. We look forward to this evening and invite you to join us there.

The planning committee consists of Win Wetherbee, Francis Jones, Patrick Eggleton and Jeff Lehman. Our featured speaker will be Fernando Gouvêa from Colby College in Maine. He is presently the editor of *Focus* and *Focus Online*. He is co-author with William Berlinghoff of the book *Math Through the Ages*. He is also scheduled to present a MAA lecture in Atlanta in January 2005.

The Board will discuss the program during their meeting in Atlanta, so be sure to submit any ideas by the middle of December.
